The baby on page 1 is referring to Ocie Graham. Jim (page 3) is their nephew, son of William Corell. Oscar (page 4) is their 11 year old brother. Mary (page 4) is Maggie's oldest child (10 yrs at this writing). Kathleen (page 4) is Anne's 2 year old daughter.

The original letter did not include any periods. Paragraphs below roughly reflect the different pages of the letter.

Jan 5, 1904

Dear Maggie

I have been putting off writing thinking I would get come down but it looks now as I never will get to come. The roads are so slick I recond (reckon) I will have to walk if I get to see you before you move. I am going to try to come down. How is the baby? Has her neck got well? Is the rest of the folks well? I have been sick and have not gotten well yet with a pain in my neck and shoulder. I can turn my head to do any good.
