William M. Hickam, 72, died April 17, at West Penn Hospital.

Dr. Hickam, a native of Loudoun County, had lived in Churchill since 1948.

A graduate of Randolph-Ma-

con and Virginia Polytechnic Institute, he started his professional career at Westing-

house in Pittsburgh in 1942.

During his 42 years with Westinghouse Research Laboratories, he received numerous awards and honors. His research resulted in 100 publications, 32 U.S. Patents, 10 Westinghouse products, and three corporate services. He rose to the rank of consultant, the highest technical rank in Westinghouse, and received the highest Westinghouse employee award, the Order of

A major contribution was his application of oxygen sensors to combustion control, which was the basis for the formation of the Westinghouse Combustion Control Division located in Orville, Ohio.

In 1950, he was one of the original board members of the Pittsburgh Conference on Analytical Chemistry and Applied Spectroscopy. Over the years, he held many positions in this organization and recently completed a written documentation of its history. He was an elder in the Beulah

Presbyterian Church and was active in the Blackridge Civic Association and Kiwanis. In 1980, he received an hon-

orary Doctor of Science Degree from Randolph-Macon College.

After retiring from Westinghouse in 1984, he wrote and published his first book, "Beyond the Blue Ridge." In this autobiography, he celebrates a firm commitment to and love for others, a sense of self and a joy in simply being alive. He is survived by his wife,

Marie Kadavy Hickam; three daughters, Susan Castellana of Sterling, Virginia Linda Trumbull of Mount Lebanon, Pa., and
